2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

Major Initiatives of IQAC for the Academic Year 2016-17

a) A Career Counselling program for B.Com. & BBA students was organized by *Aastha*, the College Women Cell in collaboration with Equal Opportunity Centre, Chandra Kamal Bezbaruah Commerce College on August 24, 2016. Renowned Career Counsellor Dr.Gouranga Kumar Sharma was invited as Resource Person. Dr. Sharma oriented the students on career opportunities in commerce and clarified the queries coming from the participants.

- b) A very successful Blood Donation Camp was organised in the College premises by the NCC & NSS Wings of Chandra Kamal Bezbaruah Commerce College in collaboration with JMCH (Jorhat Medical and College Hospital) and Red Cross Society on September 19, 2016. Students & Faculty of the college voluntarily and enthusiastically participated in the event.

- For Internal Assessment, the college adopts re-valuation & re-totalling of answer scripts of Sessional Exams if any discrepancy is noticed. Students are shown their scripts to rectify their weak points.
- A thorough scrutiny of Question Papers by at least 2 teachers of the respective department to ensure that it is as per syllabus and finally given to print.
- ➤ Uniformity in corrections is ensured by discussion of answer key by teachers of the respective departments to bring about balance and quality evaluation.
- As prescribed by the Dibrugarh University, the college follows Continuous Internal Assessment to bring about balance and uniformity in teaching & evaluation. The Head of the Institution forms an Examination Committee to see to the Internal Examinations of the college. 2 to 3 members form part of this committee for a period of one year. They oversee all the Internal Assessment Evaluation prescribed by the Dibrugarh University to its affiliating colleges.

The zeal for social service and humanitarian initiatives are heartily supported by the college fraternity. Through clubs and NGOs like *Khuj&HELP*, the students along with faculty members, try in their own small way to succour the needy by distributing food packets, clothes, etc. especially those affected by flood and natural calamities. The students distribute free books to friends who are financially weak. Instances are there of our students arranging blood units and collecting money from their teachers and friends to help fellow friends and their families in times of crisis- like a life-threatening disease or unforeseen motor accidents. Such experiences and predicaments bring them face to face with the realities of life.

- B. Induction programs are conducted for the B. Com & BBA First Semester students of the college.
- C. Campus and classroom cleanliness drives are conducted to instil in the students a respect for public property.
- D. Students are encouraged to respect their culture and tradition. The students' union body is given to play key roles in organizing the 'Saraswati Puja' celebration held on a day in January-February every year. Many ex-students and visitors from various colleges and nearby localities also throng the college on this day celebrated in honour of the Goddess of Learning. The birth anniversary of Dr. BhupenHazarika, the 'bard of Brahmaputra' and cultural icon of Assam is also observed annually on 8<sup>th</sup> September. The death anniversary of RupkonwarJyoti Prasad Agarwalla, the founder of Assamese cinema, is observed as 'ShilpiDiwas' on 17<sup>th</sup> January.

#### E. Associations and Clubs for Extension Activities:

NSS, NCC, Khuj (a student service club in which quite a number of our students are members), and Help (an NGO instituted by faculty and students of the college) are associations dedicated to community service and outreach programmes. The main aim of these associations is to involve students in community service, instil in them a desire to serve, encourage them to think about society and motivate them to act and intervene in social issues. First semester students are advised to be an active member of either NSS or NCC. Students select their choice of association during their admission to First Semester itself. Attendance credit is given to students who devote their time to community and social service.

### 6.2 Does the Institution has a Management Information System

Yes, the Institution has MIS. The students' feedback on various aspects of College facilities is regularly gauged and improvement plan as per the comments received are initiated. The institution collects feedback on regular basis from students on Quality of Education, Provision of Resources, etc. The feedback forms collected from students are analysed and improvement plans to enhance Quality of Education are initiated. The students' feedback related to teaching learning process is communicated to faculty members for improvement. Wherever possible, the institution sets up meetings with parents in order to brief them about progress of their wards. The brief summaries of feedback received are discussed in the IQAC meetings and follow-up actions are taken.

Further, to make teaching-learning process more effective, the college tries toincorporate upgraded technological services through the use of ICT and its concomitant equipment.

### 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- ➤ Curriculum is properly developed by the Dibrugarh University from time to time. Faculty from the college are often made members of the Board of Studies.
- ➤ The Institution has collaborated with various Professional Institutions in order to conduct Career Development Programmes and Career Counselling Programmes.
- ➤ It has also entered into Academic Partnerships and Partnerships with Professional Institutions like Kaziranga University for mutual growth.

### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

It is the continuous endeavour of the college to better its Teaching and Learning practice. The traditional Lecture method is the predominantly used methodology by all the teachers of the institution. Additionally, every teacher is encouraged to try innovative methods of teaching and learning along with the traditional chalk and talk method. Not forgetting the teacher's role in classroom management, emphasis is also laid on the learner's experience and experiment with situations. Subject specific research for students, role plays, case study analyses, rural camps, outdoor programmes, social and industrial visits are among the many innovative pedagogical methods adopted. Shared teaching is also practised in the institution.

Various modern equipment are provided to attract the attention of the students like smart class room, projector etc. Moreover, the college conducts departmental seminars and group discussions to enhance the knowledge of the students in various current topics. The college also regularly convenes meeting of the heads of department to discuss about the progress of course and syllabus.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

As prescribed by the University, the College conducts two sessional examinations of 40 marks each in every semester. The marks are displayed in the respective notice boards of the departments. Students are given the option of going through their answer scripts if they so desire and any mistakes/queries are thoroughly discussed and dealt with on the spot itself. 5 marks each are allotted to students with regular attendance and a maximum of 5 marks for performance in Group Discussions and Institutional Seminars.

The end-semester exams and evaluation are conducted as per direction of the university.

### 6.3.4 Research and Development

- Research has been considered an important and integral part of the academic endeavours of the College. Seminars and Workshops are organized by the College to provide latest knowhow and information on research methodology. The College promotes faculty participation in research by granting them leave, helping them in participation of faculty improvement programmes and arranging for books required by them. The institution follows a policy of felicitating faculty members who have acquired Ph.D. degree. Few colleagues visit the home of the Awardee to felicitate him or her with the traditional *phulamgamusa* and a bouquet. In this way, faculties are motivated to pursue research work.
- Research articles by faculty are published in peer-reviewed and non-peer-reviewed journals.
- ➤ The faculty regularly undertakes UGC-sponsored Major and Minor Research Projects.
- ➤ The IQAC, Chandra Kamal Bezbaruah Commerce College, published the first volume of *Divergence*, a collection of articles on varied topics with ISBN in 2016.
- A biennial journal is published by the students of Banking Department to boost the spirit of inquiry in students.
- A hand-written journal in Assamese, named 'Prayas', is brought out by the MIL Department every year to cultivate their thirst for creativity and research.
- ➤ A One-day Workshop on 'Question Paper Setting' under FDP was organised by the Teaching Learning & Evaluation sub-committee, IQAC, Chandra Kamal Bezbaruah Commerce College on April 28, 2017.

### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- ➤ The Administrative Block of the institution is being extended to accommodate a more spacious New Library. As and when the New Library is ready, the Old Library may be converted to classrooms.

### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- ➤ To make Teaching and Learning innovative, research-oriented, and up-to-date, the College organises conferences, seminars and faculty development workshops. This enables faculty members to gain knowledge and expertise on interdisciplinary research and studies in addition to helping them in improving their teaching-learning processes. In this connection, a One-day Workshop on 'Question Paper Setting and Evaluation' under FDP was organised by the Teaching Learning & Evaluation sub-committee, IQAC, Chandra Kamal Bezbaruah Commerce College on April 28, 2017. Prof.MukutHazarika, Dean, School of Education, Dibrugarh University, participated in this workshop as the Resource Person.
- ➤ The College has adopted a mandatory Self-Appraisal Method to evaluate the performance of the faculty in teaching, research and extension programmes. At the end of the academic year every teacher is given an Academic Performance Indicator (API) form on the basis of the UGC regulations. The form requires the teacher to give his/her self-evaluation of the academic, co-curricular and extracurricular work done during that year. It also requires the teacher to enumerate the papers presented at conferences, seminars, refresher courses and orientation programmes he/she has attended.
- > The report to be filled in by each teacher is also evaluated. It analyses the duties performed with respect to lectures completed as per the teacher's planned lecture schedules, lectures taken. The Principal appreciates in the staff meetings the notable performance of any faculty member and then persuades the other faculty members to follow such best practices in the interest of the College and self-development.
- The evaluation of teaching faculty by the student and the peers has been adopted in our college which helps in self-evaluation and development.

### 6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Teachers as nation builders have a very significant part to play in moulding and shaping the mind and lives of students. They are an indispensable part of any educational institution. The College prides itself on having a highly proficient teaching faculty who strive relentlessly towards upholding the values and beliefs of the Institution. The faculty strives towards creating an environment that is favourable to learning by disciplining students through example and showing them the right path that leads to a better and brighter future.

Recruitment procedure is followed as per government directives. On the basis of requirement, advertisements are placed in leading newspapers & applications are invited from suitable and eligible candidates.

- An institution can be considered truly successful if its students emerge from their alma mater not only as job-ready individuals but also if its students are mentally and emotionally equipped to take on the challenging and cut-throat world. Chandra Kamal Bezbaruah Commerce College makes every effort to achieve this in addition to preparing students for the job-market.
- ➤ HDFC Life also conducted a Campus Placement drive on January 20, 2017.
- Experts are invited from various fields to deliver guest lectures and industrial visits are arranged. On February 6, 2017, the 53<sup>rd</sup> Foundation Day M. C Chakraborty Memorial Annual Lecture was delivered by Mr.NarendraNarzary, Chief Manager, Training Centre, SBI, Jorhat who gave a very informative talk on the topic "Changing Environment of Cashless Payments and Role of Customers". Students of the Institution were greatly benefitted by the lecture.
- ➤ Many students are placed every year in different organizations through interviews conducted in our college by local and national industries. The first phase of Campus Recruitment Drive was conducted by TCS, Kolkata for the 6<sup>th</sup> Semester B. Com & BBA students in the college on 7 February 7, 2017. 




### **ANALYSIS OF FEEDBACK ON CURRICULUM 2016-2017**






Overall impression regarding satisfaction of students, parents and alumni regarding the B.Com and BBA course offered by Dibrugarh University.
